student spotlight **OSCARINA PEPIN**

A personal essay by Oscarina Pepin, a senior Crusader at Dr. Jorge Alvarez High School, Providence, Rhode Island.

When people in my community walk by 340 Broad Street they see a colorful mural that triggers emotions and is thought provoking. The painting itself is ambiguous; everyone who walks by it is left to their own imaginations. I have heard that some see a butterfly and others, a heart. I see a sea creature, specifically a seal. Three years ago, I collaborated with the Southside Culture Center of Rhode Island to bring color and life into my community. I wanted to create a piece of artwork that the community could be proud of.

As I walk further down Broad Street, I encounter my high school, Dr. Jorge Alvarez. Six years ago, I emigrated from the Dominican Republic with my family seeking a better future. On Broad Street, you will find people with the same aspirations as my family- a stable economic future, an education, and safety. I share a classroom every day with those that share a similar story to mine. My high school welcomes immigrants from all over the world. I have received a depth of knowledge from my peers. From my good friend, I was surprised to learn that most Guatemalans do not speak Spanish, they speak K'iche', a Mayan language that is centuries old.

I thought it was out of my reach due to the cost. However, the College Crusade made it possible.

As I continue to explore my neighborhood, I pass the College Crusade, a community-based organization that I have been a part of since middle school. Through the College Crusade, I have received guidance and opportunities that allowed me to explore my passions and academic interests. One such program was the Rhode Island School of Design (RISD) Project Open Door program, which was introduced to me during my freshman year. I ignored this opportunity at first because I thought it was out of my reach due to the cost. However, the College Crusade made it possible. I had the opportunity to explore my love for photography. The best part of the program was capturing images of things that you wouldn't see with your eyes, such as the little fishes that bring life to the Providence River.

This program was life changing for me because without it, I would not have found my passion and future career.

The opportunities were endless. The next summer, I participated in the College Crusade's Dolphin Program at the Block Island Maritime Institute. I lived on Block Island for three days and researched invasive species, learned about the sodium of the water, temperature, and about microspecies that live in the ocean and lakes around me. This program was life changing for me because without it, I would not have found my passion and future career. I see myself as a Marine Biologist exploring the wonders of the oceans.

My mother always said, "Has algo que te guste," which means, "do something that you like doing." With those words and with the guidance and financial support from the College Crusade of Rhode Island, I have been motivated to explore my interests. Though one may look at my interests and think marine biology and art do not go hand in hand, they do to me. They represent both my curiosity for the world around me and the beauty that it holds; something that can never been taken away from me.





our visionary **DR. PETROCELLI**

Dr. Americo W. Petrocelli founded The College Crusade in 1989 while serving as the state's Commissioner for Higher Education. His purpose was to increase the number of Rhode Island students who graduate from high school and enroll in higher education.

Dr. Petrocelli boldly shined a bright light on the obstacles that were keeping many of our state's most talented students out of college classrooms. He understood that students have higher expectations for their own educational achievement when they have a mentor who believes and encourages them from a young age. His idea combined early and sustained mentoring for students throughout their school years with a scholarship incentive. Over the past three decades, his vision has remained a foundational principle at the core of our organization and continues to guide our approach to increasing college access and success for young people. Dr. Petrocelli had an incredible gift to unite elected officials, higher education leaders and the corporate community on issues that matter to the future well-being of our state. Dr. Petrocelli passed away August 12, 2018. We honor his legacy with our ongoing commitment to the work he started.
